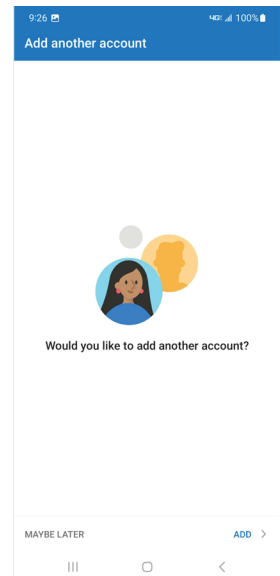
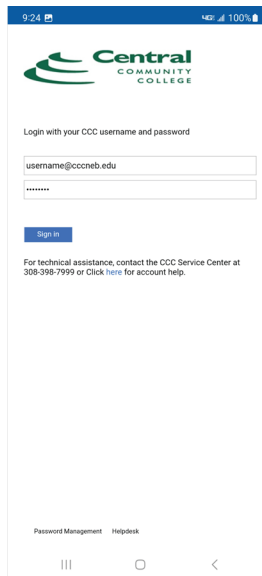
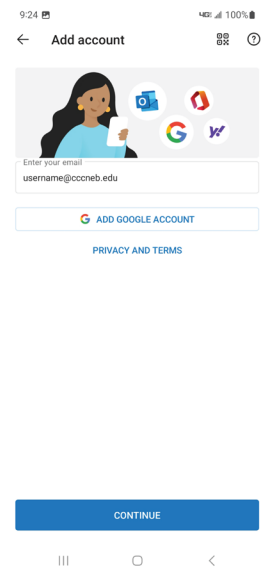
How to Configure the Outlook App Central Community College Email

1. On your mobile device, go to the App store and install the Microsoft Outlook App.
2. Open the app and tap **Add Account**.

4. Enter your Password and confirm a MFA prompt.
5. SKIP the option to add another account and wait a moment to download your Inbox.

College Information

Academic Standards Policy

A 2.0 cumulative grade-point average (GPA) is required to receive a degree, diploma, or certificate from Central Community College. To encourage satisfactory progress throughout the student's course of study, the college's academic standards policy establishes specific criteria to be met by all students enrolled in credit courses. The college provides support for students experiencing difficulty in meeting academic standards. Assessment of academic skills, completion of foundations course work, modifications in course schedules, and/or development and participation in academic recovery plans are examples of intervention strategies which the college may employ to assist students experiencing academic difficulty. Advisors

Consult your academic advisor every step of the way: when you arrive at CCC, while you are a student here and when you are making plans for your future. It is strongly recommended that students work with their advisors to create a course of study, for registration, changes in registration, graduation, and other enrollment procedures. Assessment of Student Learning

Central Community College publishes student-learning outcomes by program. A copy may be obtained from the specific program faculty member. The faculty will assess the student's academic achievement of the published outcomes at or near the end of the student's program. Depending on the number of students enrolled in a program, all degree-seeking students or a randomly selected sample of these students will be required to participate in the assessment process.

The college will assess student learning through one or more of the following measurements:

1. Development of a portfolio of a student's works such as exams, report papers, videos, and etc.
2. A capstone experience (course or part of a course) where a student will complete a project using all of the skills learned throughout the program of study.
3. Series of exams.
4. A combination of the above

The assessment process provides information to the faculty for improving the quality of student learning. The assessment process has no impact on the student's grades or graduation.

Athletics

Central Community College provides intercollegiate athletic competition in men's basketball, women's basketball, women's volleyball, men's golf, men's soccer, women's soccer, women's softball, and co-ed shotgun sports under the governance of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA). Shotgun sports is based at the Hastings Campus. All other athletic offerings are based at the Columbus Campus.

Central Community College offers competition in co-ed eSports under the governance of NJCAAe. Co-ed eSports is offered collegewide with competitions held virtually.

Attendance

Regular attendance and conscientious work habits are necessary to meet college-level expectations for standards of progress. Instructors may evaluate attendance as part of your grade, and students are encouraged

to read the syllabus and understand their instructor's attendance policy. It is important to attend all class sessions, so that you can get the help you need from instructors and take tests during the scheduled lab or class period.

Good attendance will not only help you learn and earn better grades, but it also demonstrates responsibility and reliability, characteristics which faculty and future employers value.

If you know you will be absent for a short period of time, please notify your instructor(s). If you will be absent for an extended period of time, please contact the Director of Student Development to discuss a Leave of Absence.

If attendance becomes a problem, your advisor may be notified, and you may be required to meet with the advisor prior to your return to class.

Bookstores

Barnes & Noble College operates a bookstore at each of the major campus sites of the college. Besides books and college supplies, the bookstore also offers a variety of merchandise for student purchases. The bookstore establishes textbooks refund policies as directed by the Barnes & Noble College. Customer hours are posted at each campus bookstore. Books can be purchased at www.cccneb.edu/bookstore. Central Community College has partnered with Barnes & Noble College to offer the Raider Ready textbook program. This comprehensive program ensures that all students have access to required learning materials by the first day of class. Students will receive both physical textbooks, provided on a rental basis, and digital course materials, which will be delivered directly through Canvas. While students are automatically opted into the Raider Ready program, they can choose to opt out and purchase their textbooks through other sources. Campus Activity Board

The Campus Activities Board (CAB) is open to all students in good standing on their respective campuses and meets regularly or as needed with the advisor. CAB members play an active role in planning, promoting, and assisting with social, recreational, and educational activities for the entire student

body. As part of the campus board structure, members serve as spokespersons, advocating for student ideas and suggestions while sharing recommendations for campus and activity improvements with faculty, administration, and fellow students.

Campus Closings

When severe weather arrives overnight or appears imminent in the morning, the decision to open or close a campus usually is made by 6:45 a.m. Because the college is open until 10 p.m. on weekdays, a later decision to close may be made if severe weather develops after classes begin at 8 a.m.

Closings will be announced through CCCAlerts (see Emergency Alert Notification System below).

In the event of inclement weather, you may check school closing and late start information by calling 1-877-CCC-0780 and then following the prompt to "School Closing Information".

Campus closings will also be posted on WebCentral, on the CCC web page, and announced in local media.

Emergency Alert Notification System (CCC Alerts)

Central Community College has partnered with Rave Mobile Safety to provide an emergency alert notification system, called CCC Alerts.

This system is capable of delivering messages to your college and personal e-mail accounts, as well as your home phone or cell phone.

CCC Alerts will give emergency direction and notification to students, staff, and faculty upon the College's confirmation of a significant emergency, dangerous situation, or campus closure. Students are automatically enrolled in CCC Alerts when they register for classes. Students may update their phone numbers and email addresses for CCC Alerts at www.getrave.com/login/cccneb.edu by entering your CCC email address and password. If you do not have your password, use the "Forgot username or password" link on the login page.

Equatio Software for Math and Science

Equatio is an advanced equation editor

that makes math and science accessible and helps students succeed. It generates alternative text for equations and includes a formula prediction feature to make writing math and science quicker and easier. With Equatio, students can create and edit formulas visually, write and convert LaTeX equations, use speech input to turn spoken math into digital format, read math from screenshots aloud, and more.

Equatio works across multiple platforms—including Google, Windows, and Mac—and integrates with popular learning management systems such as Canvas. All students may download Equatio software via WebCentral using the Student Resources menu. For questions, contact your area Academic Success Center www.cccneb.edu/asc.

Face Coverings

The safety and overall well-being of CCC students and staff is an important priority for Central Community College. Should federal, state, or local directives be issued, the College will act in accordance with such directives and may implement procedural requirements for students, which could include expectations for face coverings in certain situations. Any recommendations or requirements for students will be communicated to registered students through their CCC email.

Financial Aid

Central Community College participates in multiple financial aid programs. These programs include Federal Pell Grant, Federal Work-Study, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG), Federal Direct Loan, Federal Direct Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS), Nebraska Opportunity Grant, and various institutional, private, and organizational scholarships.

To apply for financial aid, students must complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) each academic year. While there is no set deadline at CCC, some forms of aid have limited funding. To ensure students qualify for the maximum aid, it is best to submit the FAFSA by March 1st before the start of the academic year.

Additionally, CCC offers many scholarships for both new and returning students. Students can apply online starting October 1, and the deadline to submit the application is March 1st before the academic year begins.

Fire Emergency

State law requires that when a fire alarm sounds, all persons on the premises must evacuate the building and remain a minimum of 150 feet from the building and off any access roads.

In the event of a fire or another emergency, notification will be by fire alarm. When the fire alarm sounds, students are to immediately leave the building via the closest exit. Campus personnel will notify students when it is safe to re-enter buildings.

The college views unauthorized use and tampering with fire equipment (extinguishers and alarms) as a serious offense. Severe sanctions may be imposed if such violations occur.

First Aid

First aid kits are available in each building. Please check with building staff for the location of medical supplies. Use building medical supplies when administering first aid. If an injury requires further medical attention, a local physician or hospital should be contacted.

Central Community College reserves the right to contact a physician and/or call for an ambulance in case of student illness or injury if the situation, in the judgment of the college official, merits such action.

Food and Hygiene Pantry

CCC has food and hygiene pantries at the Columbus, Grand Island, and Hastings campuses and at the Kearney Center, that are free and anonymous for students in need. They provide support for CCC Students by offering products to our students in a time of need, including canned food, boxed meals, breakfast items, hygiene items, and simple recipes. Food Service

Cafeteria service is provided by Chartwells at both the Hastings and Columbus campuses. A snack bar is provided by Chartwells at the Grand Island and Hastings Campuses. Food service is not available during the Fall Break, Thanksgiving Break, the December/Holiday

Break, and Spring Break. Food service is available on the weekends at the Hastings and Columbus campuses. Students residing on-campus must contract for both housing and meals. Students may select between a 200-meal block plan or a 300-meal block plan when they complete their Housing Contract.

Gambling Policy

Students are expected to abide by the federal laws and the laws of Nebraska prohibiting illegal gambling, including online gaming. Gambling for money or other things of value on campus or at college-sponsored activities is prohibited, except as permitted by law. Such prohibited activity includes, but is not limited to: betting on, wagering on, or selling pools; possessing on one's person or premises (e.g., residence hall room, car, etc.) any card, book or other device for registering bets; knowingly permitting the use of one's premises or one's phone or other electronic communications device for illegal gambling; knowingly receiving or delivering a letter, package or parcel related to illegal gambling; offering, soliciting or accepting a bribe to influence the outcome of an athletic event; and involvement in bookmaking or wagering pools with respect to athletic events.

Grades and Transcripts

Students may access their final term grades and unofficial transcript through WebCentral at My CCC >Grades. For final grades by term, select the term you want to view. For your complete unofficial transcript, select the Academics menu at the top and select Unofficial Transcript.

Grade Appeal Policy

Faculty of Central Community College have the right and responsibility to assign grades based on work submitted. Evaluation of student performance is based on the professional judgment of instructors. A student may appeal a course grade under one or more of the following conditions:

An error was made in the numerical calculation of the final course grade.

The student believes the final grade is not indicative of their academic performance.

The instructor departed substantially from their grading rationale published in the original course syllabus/course requirements.

Only the final grade may be appealed. For additional information, please reference the grade appeal process located on the CCC website at www.cccneb.edu/gradeappeal.

Graduation

Applying for graduation:

Degrees, diplomas, and certificates are awarded three times a year (December, May, and August). A graduation/award application is required for each degree, diploma, and certificate earned. The deadline for applications for the May and summer terms is the first Friday in March and the deadline for the December term is the last Friday in October. Contact your academic advisor to submit the Graduation/Award Application to the Registration and Records Office by the deadline.

Commencement Ceremony:

All eligible students who apply to complete a diploma and/or degree may participate in a Commencement Ceremony. One All-College Winter Commencement Ceremony is held in December at one location for students completing a diploma or degree in the fall term. Spring Commencement Ceremonies are held in May for each campus (Columbus, Grand Island, and Hastings) for students completing a diploma or degree in the spring or summer term.

More information will be mailed and emailed to the graduate approximately one month before the ceremony and will also be posted online at www.cccneb.edu/graduation.

Honor Medallions

Honor medallions are awarded to degree graduates participating in commencement ceremonies who have maintained a cumulative grade point average of 3.75 or higher. Eligibility for the medallion is based on the student's cumulative GPA from all semesters prior to the semester of the commencement ceremony. The cumulative GPA used to determine eligibility is calculated through the previous fall semester for Spring Commencement and through the previous summer semester for Winter

Commencement. Honor medallions are not awarded to students earning a diploma only.

Students with questions regarding eligibility for honor medallions may contact their campus Registrar's Office.

Hazing Policy

All acts of hazing, by any individual student or sanctioned or promoted by any Central Community College registered student club or organization and any of its members or alumni, are prohibited. Students are entitled to be treated with consideration and respect, and no individual may perform any act that is likely to cause physical or psychological harm to any other person within the Central Community College community. Accordingly, any such behavior is expressly forbidden when related to the admission, initiation, pledging, joining, or any other group-affiliation activity.

A student or organization found to be involved in any hazing activity will face conduct proceedings and may be subjected to sanctions including suspension or expulsion from the College. A violation of this policy may exist irrespective of any alleged voluntary or consensual participation in the activity by the person(s) involved.

Housing

On-campus residence halls are available at Columbus and Hastings for full-time students and other students approved by the Director of Residence Life on each campus. Privately owned apartment-style residences are available adjacent to the Grand Island campus. Students enrolled full-time at the Kearney Center are eligible to apply for housing at the University of Nebraska, Kearney.

On-campus residence hall rooms are furnished with beds, mattresses, wardrobes/closets, study desks, and chairs. Students residing in the residence halls must provide their own bedding, pillows, towels, and personal items.

The residence halls will be closed to students during the December holiday break. Resident students are responsible for providing their own living accommodations during this break.

There is no on-campus housing for married students. Upon request, information about

ID Cards

All registered students can obtain a Student ID Card from the Service Center. It is advisable for students to carry their Student ID Cards while on campus. These cards are necessary for accessing CCC printers and may also be required for identification if requested by campus staff. CCC Student ID Cards can also be presented at select local businesses to receive discounts, although participation in the discount program is at the discretion of the business.

Judicial Board

The Judicial Board is a student-led court system responsible for hearing and adjudicating cases related to student behavior and potential policy violations. Judicial Board processes are led by students, with oversight from Administrative Hearing Officers and the Director of Student Development. Students may apply to join the Judicial Board, which offers several paid positions. Judicial Boards are located at the Columbus and Hastings campuses.

Leave of Absence

Leaves of absence may be granted in extraordinary circumstances such as a medical emergency. If you need to request a leave of absence, please contact the Director of Student Development. Loitering

Anyone found loitering or congregating on college grounds after 1:30 a.m. may be questioned by campus security and requested to either leave the premises or, in the case of a residence hall student, to return to the residence hall.

In the interest of safety, security personnel may check identification as necessary and appropriate.

Library Resource Center

Library Resource Centers offer students a comfortable, quiet atmosphere to study, learn, and relax. The staff is happy to assist students in making effective use of library services.

We provide individual assistance in the use of technologies, research techniques, and use of electronic resources. The library's website (<https://libguides.cccneb.edu/libraries>) is designed to make it easy for students to find the information they need.

Students have access to print collections, subscription databases, state and local newspapers, and a vast collection of eBooks, research guides, periodicals, and journals ranging from academic to general interest. Loss of Personal Property Policy

Central Community College is not liable for damage, theft, or loss of personal property. CCC is not responsible for loss of student data, software, or hardware caused by computer viruses. Students are advised to check their personal or family insurance for coverage.

Medical Emergency

If a student, guest, or visitor becomes ill, CCC reserves the right to call emergency medical services, if in the judgment of a college official, the situation merits such action. Students/visitors are responsible for any costs related to medical or ambulance service. In the event there is a medical emergency on campus, as a student, you must rely on your own judgment to react to the situation in a sensible matter.

If you have any doubts about the seriousness of the injury/illness, call 911. The rescue team can make the medical determination upon arrival. Do not hesitate to use any campus phone to dial 911 and give the following information:

- Your name and that you are calling from Central Community College.
- The telephone number from which you are calling.
- Complete address including town, address, building, and room number.
- Nature of the problem and condition of the patient.

Do NOT hang up until the dispatcher indicates they have all the instructions or information they need.

After you have made the initial call, please inform campus security personnel of the emergency by calling (402) 910-6665 on the Columbus Campus, (308) 258-4342 on the Grand Island Campus, or (402) 705-1389 on the Hastings Campus.

Medical Financial Responsibility

The student is responsible for all costs incurred for any medical treatment or transportation.

Military Recruitment/Solomon Amendment Policy

The Solomon Amendment is a federal law that allows military recruiters to request and access certain recruiting information from institutions about students. The recruiting information data is considered directory information under FERPA or data that would normally be collected by Central Community College. The 1995/1996 National Defense Authorization Act and the 1997 Omnibus Consolidated Appropriations Act gave branches of the military access to student information including student's name, address, telephone number, age or date of birth, class, and major. In compliance with the Solomon Amendment, CCC shall cooperate and comply with requests from military recruiters for student information.

Missing Student Policy

Central Community College places a high priority on student safety. The college has established procedures to assist in locating CCC students living in on-campus housing facilities who, based on the facts and circumstances known to the college, are determined to be

Official Communications

Students are responsible for monitoring their Central Community College email account for official communications. Students can access their CCC email account in WebCentral within the My Office menu. Communications to the entire student body are considered properly delivered when they are placed on CCC email, Canvas, WebCentral, or on the CCC website. Each student is responsible for regularly checking these sources for notices and communications from the College.

A request that a student report to an administrative or faculty office may be made by letter, email, or telephone. Failure to comply with such a request may result in disciplinary action under the Student Code of Conduct.

PaperCut

As part of Central Community College's 3C Green Initiatives, CCC has instituted PaperCut to monitor printing and to help reduce paper waste.

Students are charged for printing done on campus through the PaperCut system. Each student receives a \$10 credit on their account at the beginning of each semester. Students can purchase additional printing if needed. Contact the Student Accounts Office with questions or to place additional funds in your PaperCut account.

Pre-Enrollment Assessment

All certificate, diploma, and degree-seeking students (and those enrolling in a math, reading, writing, or English Language Learner course) are encouraged to take a pre-enrollment assessment prior to enrollment.

Assessment scores will be utilized to recommend proper course placement to help ensure academic success www.cccneb.edu/assessment.

Pregnancy & Parenting

Privacy of Educational Records/ FERPA Policy

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 (PL93-380), affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. FERPA defines "education records" as

those records: directly related to a student; and maintained by an institution or a party acting for the institution.

FERPA provides students who reach the age of 18, or who attend Central Community College, with the right to inspect and review their own education records. Students also have the right to request an amendment to their education records and to have some control over the disclosure of personally identifiable information contained in these records. Privacy Policy

It is the policy of Central Community College to recognize and protect the privacy rights and intellectual property rights of students, faculty, employees, and of the College. Central Community College prohibits the unauthorized use on College properties of electronic or other audio and video recorders, including but not limited to camera phones, PDA's, digital cameras, etc., capable of recording sounds and images where students, guests and employees have an expectation of privacy or where proprietary, confidential and restricted information such as tests, student records, etc., are in use or are stored.

Public Records Request Policy

Information requested under the Buckley Amendment, or the Nebraska Public Records Act will be responded to only after a written request has been received by either the Senior Director of College Communications or the College President. A copy of the written request, along with a copy of the information being released, will be maintained by the Vice President of Administrative Services for a period of two years from the date of the request.

Registered Sex Offenders-Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act

Registered sex offenders who plan to attend classes at any location of the College must register with the Director of Student Development Office within ten (10) days of enrolling or on the first day of class attendance, whichever is earlier. Failure to register within this time frame constitutes a basis for exclusion from the College. The College reserves the right to deny admission or continued enrollment to any student who may create an unreasonable risk of harm to the health, safety, welfare, or prosperity of CCC, members of its community, or themselves. Individuals who are required by the state of Nebraska to register as a sex offender shall also not be permitted to reside in any College residence hall.

Anyone who disagrees with a decision made pursuant to this policy may appeal that decision to the Vice President of Student Success and Enrollment Management, by making a request in writing for review within seven (7) calendar days of the date of any decision made pursuant to this policy. The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), 20 U.S.C. Section 1232g does not prevent educational institutions from disclosing information concerning registered sex offenders provided under the Wetterling Act, October 25, 2000, including information made available under the Campus Sex Crimes Preventions Act (CSCPA) 42 U.S.C. 14071(j), amendment (October 28, 2002) to that Act, and as any of the foregoing statutes may from time to time be amended.

Resident Assistant Team

There is a Resident Assistant (RA) Team located on both the Columbus and Hastings campuses. Resident Assistants understand and promote campus policies and procedures, assist in resolving residents' concerns, and plan fun and educational activities for residents, among other things. Each member is a resource for residents needing information about Residence Life or the other areas of campus.

Students may apply for RA positions in the spring semester and should be committed to the position for at least one year. Students must live in campus housing to serve on the team.

Room Scheduling

Students can reserve rooms for club meetings or other events. Contact the Student Activities and Engagement office to inquire about availability and room reservations.

Safety and Security Tips

Residence, personal, or vehicle keys should be carried at all times and never given to others. Residence hall room doors should be closed even when the student leaves for a short period. Doors within the residence halls should never be propped open. Vehicles should be parked in lighted areas and kept locked at all times. Valuables in vehicles should be concealed or removed.

Do not walk alone, especially in unlit areas. Campus security is available for students who would like an escort while walking to class or

a vehicle. In case of emergencies, immediately contact campus security.

Sexual Misconduct/Harassment

Solicitation

Student Active-Duty Service Policy

Central Community College shall ensure a penalty-free process for withdrawing/leaving for any CCC student who is called to active duty with the United States Armed Forces. The student is responsible for providing written evidence of being called to active duty, normally in the form of activation orders. If orders are not immediately available, a letter from the student's Commanding Officer, stating the student is being called to active duty and awaiting pending publication of orders, is acceptable. This policy applies to all students regardless of service branch or affiliation (National Guard, Reserves or Active duty). Activation means the call to duty of a member of the United States Armed Forces for either state or federal service. INSTANCES OF ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

- Cheating - Engaging in any behavior intended to achieve an unfair advantage for self or another in any academic exercise (i.e., unauthorized collaboration or unauthorized use of resources or data in a study).
- Fabricating Information - Inventing or falsifying information (i.e., making up resources and/or citations, falsifying academic records)
- Facilitating Academic Dishonesty - Soliciting, furnishing, or offering to furnish unauthorized exams, quizzes, or academic materials, participating in academic sabotage.

When inclement weather threatens, the president of the college or their designee will make any necessary decisions to cancel classes, delay classes, or close the college and all its operations. The decision will be announced through CCCAlerts and on area radio, television stations, and the college website. Every attempt will be made to have the announcement aired by 6 a.m. on the day of the closing or delay. If

the college is already operating when inclement weather forces such a decision, CCCAlerts and a collegewide email will be used, as well as public media, to announce the decision. Students are encouraged to monitor their local weather and driving conditions to determine if they can safely travel to class. If hazardous conditions exist, students should use their own discretion about traveling..

Tornado/Severe Thunderstorm Procedures

Tornadoes and thunderstorms typically occur in the spring and summer seasons. It is important to understand the meanings of various weather notices in order to ensure your personal safety.

- **Tornado or Thunderstorm Watch:** Weather conditions are favorable for the possible development of tornadoes or severe thunderstorms. Continue normal activities but monitor the situation and notify others if conditions deteriorate.
- **Tornado or Thunderstorm Warning:** A tornado or thunderstorm is occurring or sighted in the area. In addition to dark clouds and/or hail, the emergency siren may sound. If you hear a civil defense siren, receive a severe weather announcement, or threatening weather looks eminent, move to a designated tornado shelter area as quickly as possible..

Things to do:

- Move to a designated tornado shelter and stay away from windows and areas with glass.
- Close all doors leading into tornado shelters
- Avoid auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other large rooms with free-span roofs.
- Do not use elevators.
- Protect your head and face. Cover your eyes with your hands. Coats, jackets, and books may be used to cover your head, arms, and legs to protect them from flying glass and other debris.
- Do not leave the shelter until you have been notified by campus personnel that the warning has expired.

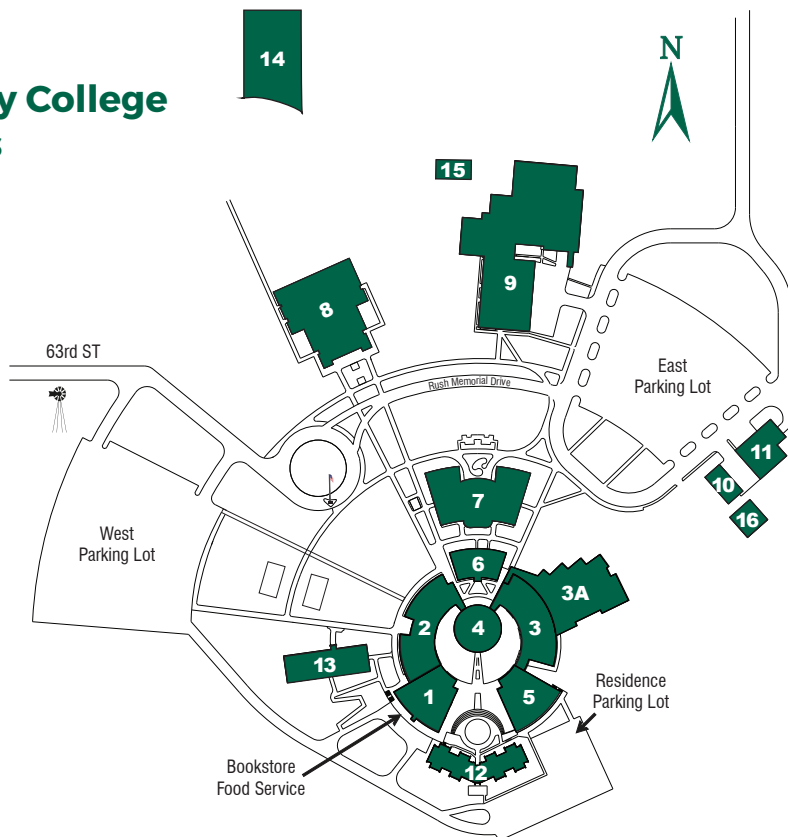
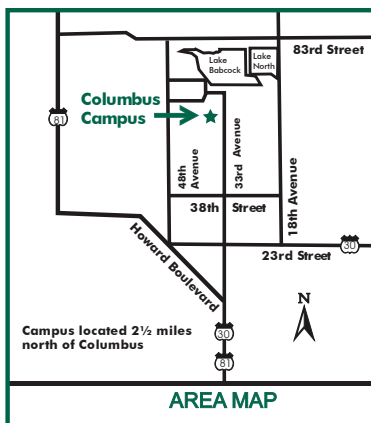

Intramurals

Intramural activities are provided in a variety of intramural and informal sports activities designed to meet the diverse needs and interests of our students. Activities and dates are posted throughout the campus. An open gym and weight room schedule are also available..

Parking

Parking areas on the campus are designed to allow quick access to all buildings by emergency vehicles. Violating parking regulations can block this access and endanger students and staff in the event of an emergency. Please observe the following parking regulations:

- Only campus-authorized vehicles may be driven on campus sidewalks.
- Only residence hall students may park in the lot southeast of the South Residence Hall.
- Permits must be attached for authorized parking. Residence hall students will receive permits from the Residence Life Office.
- Disability parking is available in designated areas. Handicapped parking permits can be obtained from The State of Nebraska Depart-

ment of Motor Vehicles.

- Under certain circumstances, students may acquire an on-campus disability parking permit from the campus Disability Services Office.

Parking tickets are issued when drivers violate campus parking and traffic regulations. A record of violations and a schedule of fines are maintained in the Student Accounts Office. Students can pay campus traffic and parking tickets at the Student Accounts Office. Failure to pay tickets may result in withholding of your transcripts and delay registration for future classes.

The roads and lots by the Residence Halls and Student Center are to be used only for temporary access and for deliveries. South Residence Hall students park in the lot located southeast of the hall. West Residence Hall students park in the West Parking Lot. A permit is required.

Student Center

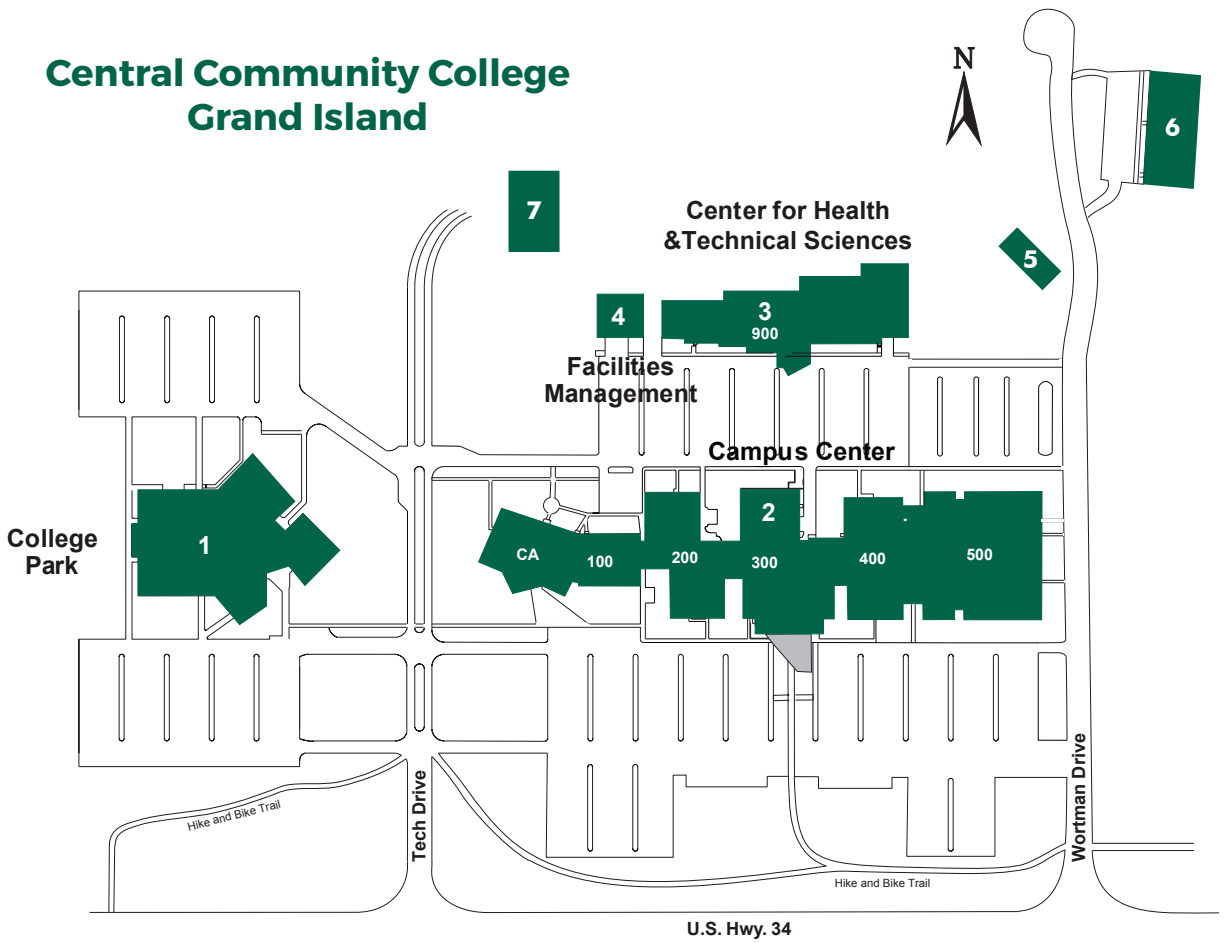

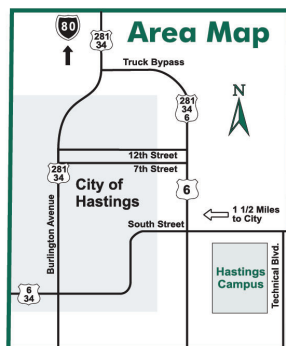

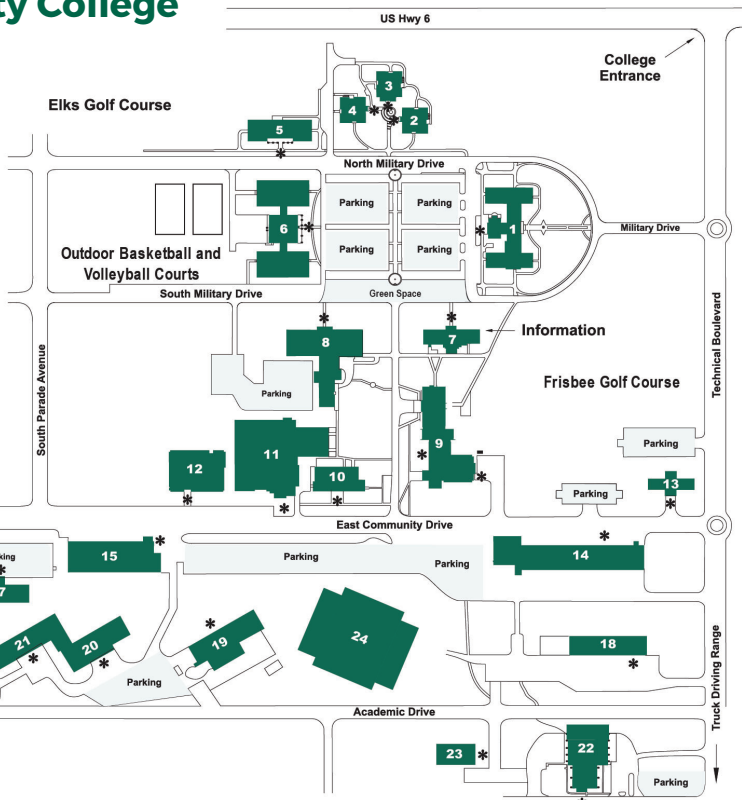

Parking

- Under certain circumstances, students may acquire an on-campus disability parking permit from the campus Disability Services Office.

Parking tickets are issued when drivers violate campus parking and traffic regulations. A record of violations and a schedule of fines are maintained in the Student Accounts Office. Students can pay for campus traffic and parking tickets at the Student Accounts Office. Failure to pay tickets may result in withholding of your transcripts and delay registration for future classes.

Traffic Regulations

Parking and/or driving is prohibited on grass plots, or any other place where parking would mar the landscaping of the campus or interfere with the use of college facilities.

Any car left in any parking area during a vacation period will be towed away at the owner's expense unless special arrangements are made with the Campus Security office.

Any car parked or stalled on the streets during snow removal will be towed at the owner's expense unless the Campus Security office has been notified and a release form has been signed so the maintenance department can move the vehicle.

Violations of existing traffic regulations or driving conduct detrimental to the college may result in loss of privileges.

The maximum speed limit on all college drives and roads is 15 mph unless otherwise posted.

Glossary Terms

During your college life at Central Community College, you may encounter several new words and phrases, which are very important to your education. We have listed some of these below with brief definitions to help you understand more about college life.

Advisor - When you enroll in a program, you will be assigned a faculty or staff advisor. Your advisor will help you plan your course of study. In addition, your advisor can help with academic concerns, program transfers, clearances from college, and other academic or personal concerns.

Credit by Program Examination/Prior Learning - If you have prior training or related work experience in your area of study, you may be eligible to receive college credit. Work with your academic advisor and the program faculty or associate dean for more information.

Credit Hour - A standard unit of measure used to ascertain the educational value of course work offered by the institution, and for which tuition is charged. CCC awards credit on the semester-hour system.

Drop and Add - Changes in registration are referred to as “drop and add.” Students may make changes to their registration by adding, dropping, or withdrawing courses by the applicable deadlines. Students are responsible for initiating changes by contacting the Registration Office directly through WebCentral (Student Planning) or via Phone Central (308) 398-7412. For specific information on add/drop/withdrawal procedures and deadlines, contact the Registration Office or view the Registration Services in the college catalog at <https://catalog.cccneb.edu/> under Student Services Offices.

Schedule changes may impact a student's financial aid and/or ability to reside in the residence hall.

Financial aid - Financial aid is money that helps students pay for college expenses. It may include grants, scholarships, loans, and work-study employment, and can come from federal, state, institutional, or private sources. Financial aid is intended to make college more affordable and is typically awarded based on financial need or academic merit. Most students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be considered.

Full-Time Student - Full-time enrollment status during the fall and spring semester consists of registering for a minimum of 12 credit hours, and 6 credit hours in the summer semester

General Education - General education courses introduce students to knowledge and skills that enable them to fulfill educational and occupational goals while at the same time enlightening them about social and cultural aspects of life. Graduates who complete general education requirements become better prepared to function effectively as citizens in a democratic and technological society. General education competency requirements are grouped into the following categories: Communications, Critical Thinking and Problem Solving, Life and Career Skills, Information and Technology Literacy, and Global Awareness.

Hybrid courses - These courses offer students course experience with both online and lecture components.

Leave of Absence - A temporary leave from college may be requested for approved medical emergencies or other extraordinary circumstances

Program of Study - A student's major area of study.

Student Electives - Classes which are not specifically spelled out in the course of study for your program. These courses are called student electives. Your advisor can assist you in choosing electives which suit your needs.



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
